Purpose

We seek to appoint a Lecturer in Classics who will develop innovative research and teaching with the goal of diversifying our curriculum. This is a permanent post, for which specialisms in Latin and Roman History are also desirable. The post will involve teaching, research, administration, impact and outreach.

Main duties and responsibilities

The University of Reading, Department of Classics, offers an exciting opportunity to join an outstanding Department with an international reputation for research and teaching. We wish to appoint a well-qualified and committed individual who will engage fully with the Department's goal of diversifying the curriculum, by means of focus on new approaches and/or new material. They will conduct research that enhances the research reputation of the Department, in areas of existing expertise such as multiculturalism and multilingualism, material culture, museology, digital humanities, and inclusivity, or in new fields germane to the Department's strengths. They will be supported in developing research by an established scheme of research leave, mentoring, and annual review. The successful applicant will take an important role in enriching the teaching and learning agenda of the Department, as well as in the wider aspects of the student experience, and they will have particular responsibility for modules in Latin and in Roman culture (literature and/or history) of the Republican and/or early to middle Empire period. They will have teaching experience in higher education, or demonstrable evidence of teaching suitable for higher education, and a track record of research and impact activity commensurate with experience and career stage.

Responsibilities will include:

- Delivering excellent teaching on modules in Latin, including at advanced undergraduate and postgraduate levels, and in Roman culture;
- Contributing to programme development and/or module design, especially with a view to diversifying the curriculum with innovative research-led modules;
- Conducting research leading to outputs of internationally recognised (4* and 3* REF) quality and developing an impact strategy for this research;
- Applying for external funding and managing successful grants;
- Contributing to the wider student experience, including as Academic Tutor;

- Supervising postgraduate research;
- Contributing to administrative and citizenship roles in the Department and the University as appropriate to the level of appointment

Post holders report to the Head of the Department of Classics.

Contact

Liaison with other schools and departments of the University and with colleagues in the central university. Some contact with external bodies.

Terms and conditions

Full-time or part-time, permanent appointment.
