Purpose

We are seeking to appoint a Teaching Fellow in Human Osteology to help deliver teaching on our new MSc Professional Human Osteoarchaeology, and undergraduate archaeology programmes. This is a 3-year teaching-intensive role with related administrative responsibilities. This post is part of an expansion of activities within our highly successful bioarchaeology teaching and research.

Main duties and responsibilities

Duties include delivering a range of existing and new teaching content at undergraduate and postgraduate level in the Department of Archaeology. The teaching fellow will support the teaching objectives of the School and Department by teaching through allocated lectures, tutorials, practicals and seminars. They will set and mark coursework and exams, providing constructive feedback to students. Candidates should hold a Masters degree in the area of human osteology and a PhD in a related subject.

Specifically, your main duties will include:

- Convene and deliver the existing Part 3 module 'Biological Anthropology' with support from Mary Lewis, and carry out related assessment and administrative duties
- Convene and deliver the new Masters module 'Musculo-Skeletal Anatomy' with support from Mary Lewis, and carry out related assessment and administrative duties
- Contribute to existing modules including: Forensic Anthropology (Part 1), Archaeological Science (Part 2), Issues and Debates (Masters) and carry out related assessment and administrative duties
- Assist in the day-to-day management of the Human Osteology Collection
- Supervise dissertation projects at undergraduate and postgraduate level
- Provide pastoral care and support academic tutees
- Participate in other enhancement activities associated with teaching and learning

The Department of Archaeology is part of the School of Archaeology, Geography and Environmental Science (SAGES).
